In an effort to maximize the generous donations we have received, our executive committee has voted to limit the recipients of our mailings. The newsletter is generally the PAFA's largest single expense in the annual budget. With the increased requests for funding from various groups within Page High School, we want to give as much back as possible. These savings will help buy technology, scholarships, art supplies, communication equipment, drama supplies, campus renovations, tutorial needs.....and the list continues to grow.

Since our inception we have also invested our time and money to other ways of spreading the PAFA news. FROM THE PRINCIPAL



Greetings!

We have many great endeavors going on at Page, and I would like to highlight just a few for our Page Alumni and Friends.

As principal, my quest is to move Pirate Land from Great to GREATER. One key factor in this journey is listening to those I serve. Therefore, each month I hold focus sessions with the faculty, staff, and students. During these sessions many questions are asked and situations are studied to help move our Pirate ship forward. In addition to those here at Page who are "on the ship," I also value the voices of our parents and other community members.

Each month, in conjunction with our PTSA, I hold a Brown Bag lunch in the media center for parents and community stakeholders. This is a time for parents to come and hear about the daily adventures of Pirate Land, to ask questions, and to make suggestions.

Obviously, the primary goal of any school is to increase student achievement, but we often neglect to seek feedback from those who are directly affected – the students. In order to make sure that our students' voices are heard, I have created a Principal's Advisory Council that I meet with monthly. These students provide me with feedback on new ideas, share student concerns, and make suggestions. Currently, the Council is working on a project to increase technology in the school.

In an effort to increase instructional time, we have implemented *No Tardy Parties* for the spring. Each grade level administrator has created criteria and goals toward which all students will strive in order to attend this event. More information for these parties can be found on our web page.

In closing, let me take another opportunity to say, thank you for welcoming me to the Pirate family with open arms! Thank you for all you do for our students, parents, and faculty. Please know that the Page Alumni and Friends Association makes a huge difference at Page High School.

PAGE CAMPUS WATCH

When Page Schools Resource Officer AT Griffiths (affectionately called "OG" by all at Page who know him) saw theft at Page this year, he decided it was time to go at it from a different angle. He publicized the Campus Crime Stoppers "test-a-tip" program by airing its logo on the school's closed circuit TV system. Tom Osswald, who teaches multi-media design, saw an opportunity for a great learning experience. His students created fliers and other promotional items to place around the school.

Becky Fallon, GCPD Crime Stoppers Coordinator, spoke with students about the anonymous crime tip program that offers cash rewards for information that leads to an arrest or indictment. Fallon stated, "Students learned that they could 'do the right thing' by providing information on a crime or criminal activity without fear of retribution or being labeled a 'snitch."

Osswald's students then formed an organization, "Page Campus Watch," to leverage the benefits of the program. Senior John Peele, the lead spokesperson of Page Crime Stoppers/Page Campus Watch Club, stated, "We at Page are simply raising awareness and working to prevent, deter, and resolve crime on campus."

Page Campus Watch is a project that has involved many curricula – multi-media design, math, and marketing – as well as sparking discussions about civic awareness and "doing the right thing." According to Fallon, it is the only high school program of its kind in the state.



THE PRINCIPAL'S ADVISORY COUNCIL

Along with the arrival of Page's new principal, Mrs. Faison, the beginning of this year brought a wonderful new tradition that presented a great opportunity for students. This tradition, known as the Principal's Advisory Council, is a group of fifteen student leaders, in all grade levels, that meet with Mrs. Faison and the Page Alumni and Friends President, Mrs. Tysinger.

The selection of the students for the Council involved an essay-based application that was designed to demonstrate leadership abilities and problem-solving skills. The council meets once a month before school for breakfast in the Media Center to discuss current issues at Page. Topics have included student turnout at athletic events, rewards for promptness to class, and technology.

Technology has received special attention recently when the Council had the opportunity to meet with some of Lenovo's executives to discuss 21st century technology in schools. The council engaged in a large variety of questions and gained insight on the effectiveness of technology in education. While a solution to the lack of technology may be a bit distant, the council is trying its very best to help Page move closer to the answer. Aside from meeting with Lenovo, council members Brian Roskelly and Alexis Scully created a video that showcases technology challenges at Page, in hopes of accelerating technological advancements sooner than later.

Every member on the council offers his or her talents and expertise, and all have been willing to pitch in on the various projects, which makes the council successful in its endeavors. Overall, this is what the Principal's Advisory Council is all about—looking for unique solutions to difficult problems.

MEDIA CENTER FUNDS DRIVE

It has been many years since Page has had the funding to substantially upgrade materials in the Media Center. But if we are to offer our students the materials they need for research so they can attain the level of education they deserve and Page can provide, the upgrading needs to be done.

According to IMPACT: Guidelines for North Carolina Media and Technology Programs, the ideal average age of books is ten years with 20 books per student. Our present average of books is 21 years with 7.67 books per student. The main focus for adding materials is the weaker areas of science and history/geography, with a hope to also expand in the area of fiction.

With technology advancing as it is, studied choices will be made concerning hard copy and ebook format.

Our Association will match up to \$5,000 all funds that come in specifically for supplementing the book collection in the Page Media Center. ALL donations are 100% tax-deductible.

What is our goal? Our goal is \$10,000+......\$5,000+ in specific funds raised to be matched with another \$5,000 from the PAFA undesignated account funds.



The Seventh Annual Page/Grimsley Rivalry Reunion was held this past September, and once again it proved to be a huge success. Not only was it successful in bringing together a full field of 288 golfers who enjoyed a beautiful Greensboro fall day, but it was also a great financial success for both schools. The event generated enough revenue through Corporate Sponsorships and registration fees to be able to donate \$11,000 to each school.

The Greensboro Grasshoppers with President and General Manager Page Pirate Donald Moore ('74) was the title Sponsor. Another major sponsor, Neese's Sausage, provided two \$1,000 student-athlete scholarship awards for each school.
